The Days of Awe

Selichot - Saturday, September 9

The High Holy Day season begins with Selichot, a collection of psalms, poetry and prayer meant to inspire us to begin the process of T'shuvah - returning. Selichot re-introduces us to the High Holy Day melodies and themes, opening us up to the essential work of the Days of Awe.

Erev Rosh Hashanah – Friday, September 15

We come together to encounter the quiet of the evening that introduces us to the first day of possibility. We gather the strength to engage in personal and communal renewal as we dedicate ourselves to bringing in the New Year in prayer and peace.

Rosh Hashanah Day 1 – Saturday, September 16

Today is the Birthday of the World. We have arrived. It is the day to hear the call of the shofar deep within us all, to be in radical amazement of the world that surrounds us. The synagogue buzzes as our family, friends and community are called together for a day of reflection and renewal. Note: We will not sound the shofar today because it is Shabhat.

Rosh Hashanah Day 2 – Sunday, September 17

The reflection continues. We gather again to resume our journey inward. The Akedah, the story of Abraham's near sacrifice of Isaac his son, challenges us to our core and defines the mood of this service. Through the liturgy, we seek acceptance of our limits and the finding of our truth. Shofar and tashlich will be done on this day.

Kol Nidre -Sunday, September 24

The sun sets, ushering in the holiest day of the year. At Kol Nidre we pray with each other, with all of our imperfections and longings for healing. The liturgy and legendary medley of songs speak of our annulment of vows and invite us in to break new ground, creating space for something new.

Yom Kippur – Monday, September 25

This is the day we all pass before God – a God who is merciful, compassionate, abounding in love, and forgiving. We ask to be granted release. We seek to be made whole, to begin anew, to move forward with our lives with all of the potential and promise that lies within each one of us.

Sarah will frame our meditation with a short text study inspired by the season, which will be followed by a silent meditation sit. She will guide you through different meditation techniques during your sit, and at the end of our session there will be a conversation about our experiences. Both curious and familiar friends of meditation are welcome to our session for a heartfelt break.

Pre-High Holy Days Zoom Series with Rabbi Cytron Toward 120: Mortality & Meaning

3 Sessions: Sundays, August 27, September 3, September 10 | 10:30 AM - 12:00pm | On Zoom Only

The High Holy Days reverberate with a notable refrain: Remember us for Life. Yet, for so many, these days are punctuated by loss, as we are pointedly reminded of those whom we loved no longer sitting beside us - parents, partners, spouses, siblings, children, friends.

In this series, we will explore the changing understandings of our Jewish traditions about "final matters". How do today's funeral practices compare with those of our forebears, and what do we make of those transformations? Does something of value remain within time-honored prayers, rules and customs that can still speak to our 21st century world of science and technology? When it comes down to it, what can we believe and for what can we hope? Maggie Pistner and Andy Halper will be presenting a midrash drama during the class. High Holiday Workshop: Six Questions for the Day of Judgment with Rabbi David Thomas

The weeks leading up to the Days of Awe are a time for *heshbon ha-nefesh* – self-reflection and personal assessment. The Talmud offers us a framework for this soul searching in the form of six questions we'll be asked on The Day of Judgment: 1. Did you deal with people faithfully? 2. Did you fix times for study? 3. Did you engage in procreation? 4. Did you hope for salvation? 5. Were your arguments for the sake of heaven? 6. Did you seek deeper meaning in life?

In this workshop we'll study the source text for these questions and ask: Are these the right questions for us in our time? Then, in a safe and loving environment, we will give participants an opportunity to begin the work of self-reflection. The goal is to provide a framework of for personal perspective, support for your journey, and deeper meaning in your holiday observances. If our onsite lots are full, park on Royals Drive (formerly Lindbergh Drive; be careful to observe signs).

Accessible Parking

If you have a disability parking tag or license plate, you may use any designated parking spot or the reserved parking area by the West/Gan Shelanu Preschool entrance. If you use the West entrance, you can take the elevator up to the Sanctuary level. Please note that an access code is needed for the elevator when going down. If you do not have an access code, please contact Andrea Blumberg at andreab@adath.net or call 952-215-3902.

If you are driving a person with a disability, you may drop that person off at the front entrance and park in an unidentified space.

Entering the Building

Please note that if you register in the few days before services, your name badge may not arrive on time, in which case we will have a name badge for you to pick up onsite when you arrive at the main entrance.

If you need assistance, an usher can pick up and deliver your name badge to you when you arrive.

No-Parking Areas

The following are FIRE LANES for emergency vehicles only:

- Entire entry road from Hillside Lane to the building
- Curbs on edges of parking lots
- Curbs next to building
- Drop-off areas at the main entrance and at the West/ Gan Shelanu Preschool entrance

(These are the circular areas in front of the doors.)

Minnetonka Police will also post temporary no parking signs on some streets.

Temporary Exit

A temporary exit will be available on the east side of the parking lot on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. You cannot enter at this opening and no parking is allowed on the residential street between Windsor Lake Dr. and

the temporary exit. Cars exiting Adath through the temporary exit

will be directed to turn right on Windsor Lake Dr. and then directed back to Royals Drive.
